Beaches and nearshore waters in Port Angeles remain open following Indian Creek spill

PORT ANGELES – Fuel from the recent Indian Creek spill is not impacting the Elwha River Estuary or nearshore areas, keeping public access open and safe. The Unified Command, consisting of federal, Tribal, state, local and company representatives, which is managing the spill to Indian Creek, confirmed that response efforts are not impacting the upcoming Paddle to Elwha event, which remains scheduled as planned by event organizers.

The Unified Command includes the Environmental Protection Agency, Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe, Washington Department of Ecology, Clallam County Sheriff's Office and Petro-Card. Other responding agencies and contractors include, Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, Clallam 2 Fire-Rescue, Focus Wildlife, and Republic Services.
